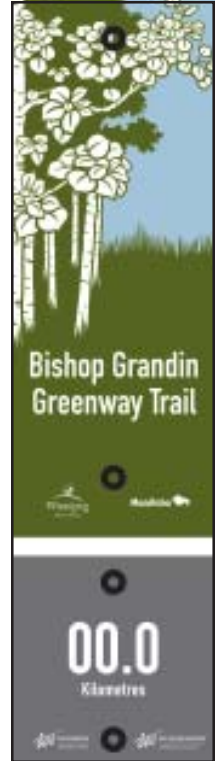

## 2008 "The Year of the Frog"



The world's leading conservationists have joined together to name 2008 "The Year of the Frog," in hopes of raising both awareness and funding needed to mitigate the amphibian extinction crisis.

One of the largest concentrations of frogs on Bishop Grandin Greenway is found just west of the Home Depot parking lot in a damp marshy area. You can help can help scientists monitor Canada's frog populations by listening to frogs calling at a pond. Perhaps the one on Bishop Grandin Greenway - or at the cottage or in your back yard. Frog Watch participants of all ages can help monitoring the frogs on a number of evenings over the calling season (April - June).

FrogWatch is part of a national volunteer monitoring program hosted by Nature Canada and Environment Canada's Ecological Monitoring and Assessment Network Coordinating Office to identify ecological changes that may be affecting our environment. Frogs are a particularly suitable indicator species because they spend part of their life in water and part on land. Unlike many other organisms, they are affected by changes to either environment.

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## **ECOLOGICAL EDUCATION SITE in DEVELOPMENT STAGES**

Children growing up in urban areas have limited direct contact with the wonders of nature. BGGI is developing an ecological education (Eco-Ed) site that can be used by schools and community youth groups to facilitate hands-on studies of local natural systems.

Located next to the retention pond just west of the Home Depot, this site will serve as a gathering spot from which students and teachers will have ready access to grassland, wetland, wooded, and aquatic habitats, right in the heart of St. Vital. A crushed limestone pad has been installed near the southeast corner of the pond, and large limestone blocks will be installed this spring to provide seating for students. We plan to add interpretive signage, and possibly improved access to the pond itself. With several schools in walking distance, we are working with teachers and community groups to develop facilities and programs that will enhance hands-on access to wild plants and animals and make ecological studies more meaningful. We want our youth to gain a deeper understanding of nature's wonders. Perhaps we adults can benefit from the site as well.



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## **KNOW YOUR NO MOW ZONE**

### **NATURALIZATION PROJECT**

Grassland and Forest Naturalization areas have been designated within the Greenway by the City of Winnipeg and BGGI. Signs indicating these NO MOW ZONES are posted north of Bishop Grandin Blvd. between St. Mary's and the Red River. These areas provide a protected habitat for many of nature's creatures. Let's take a closer look at the no-Mow Zone and see what the birds are saying about it.



Birds that were common a decade ago are now becoming rare. In the past 4 decades the populations of the evening grosbeak have plummeted by 78 percent. Pesticide use, climate change, pollution, loss of habitat and even cats have taken their toll. But loss of habitat is the greatest challenge faced by songbirds today. Most of the decline in numbers can be attributed to habitat loss. Birds need a safe place where they can hide from predators, and seek protection from harsh weather. They need places to perch, to raise their young and food to feed them. The no-mow zone is a habitat site for birds, and the place where birds get food for their nestlings.



Birds may feed from seed heads in the winter, eat a few buds in the spring, insects in summer and berries in the fall. The No-Mow zone provides an all-you-can-eat bird buffet of seeds, fruits, berries, buds, and nectar. The No-Mow zone is also home to a variety of insects and caterpillars which attract robins and other birds that rely on insects as part or of most of their diet. The native coneflower attracts American Goldfinches who are particularly fond of the seeds. And if you are a bird that likes to eat small frogs, the No-Mow is a gastronomic heaven and provides not just food but also a place to live and breed. The next time you are on the Greenway, take a few moments to step off of the beaten path onto the No-Mow Zone. Listen quietly, look up to the sky and hear the birds singing the praises of the No-Mow Zone.
